narrative is a pioneer concept in our trans disciplinary age for decades it has been one of the most successful catchwords in literature history cultural studies philosophy and health studies while the expansion of narrative studies has led to significant advances across a number of fields the travels for the concept itself have been a somewhat more complex has the concept of narrative passed intact from literature to sociology from structuralism to therapeutic practice or to the study of everyday storytelling in this volume philosophers psychologists literary theorists sociolinguists and sociologists use methodologically challenging test cases to scrutinize the types transformations and trajectories of the concept and theory of narrative the book powerfully argues that narrative concepts are profoundly relevant in the understanding of life experience and literary texts nonetheless it emphasizes the vast contextual differences and contradictions in the use of the concept

Nazarov demonstrates the value of focalization in furthering the appreciation and understanding of biblical texts. This is an excellent resource for students of narratology, biblical studies scholars, or anyone seeking to better understand the narratives of scripture.

As the first study to examine the concept of uncertainty of meaning as it relates to modern and contemporary literature and literary theory, *Literary Theories of Uncertainty* demonstrates how this notion functions as a literary feature, narrative device, and theoretical concept in 20th and 21st century texts, calling upon theories of interpretation and challenging the distinction between literature and theory. This exploration is broken down into three sections: poststructuralist legacies of uncertainty, life writing and uncertainty, and contemporary literary uncertainties. The volume takes into account related terms such as undecidability, indeterminacy, ambiguity, unreadability, and obscurity, and the topics examined include undecidability and the motif of suspension in deconstruction, Derrida and Bataille, poetry as a mode of critical discourse, and point of convergence between logico-mathematical ideas of undecidability and literary forms of uncertainty. Uncertainty in relation to speech and the impact of Robert Antelme on Mascolo and Blanchot, Proust and temporal uncertainty, uncertainty in relation to death, trauma, and autobiography, moral uncertainty in the Scandinavian welfare state and Nordic noir, the aesthetically disruptive and anti-authorian effect of uncertainty in the works of German Turkish writer Emine Sevgi Özdamar, uncertainty in the form of the double, and in relation to meta-fiction, and many more. *Literary Theories of Uncertainty* collates original and diverse discussions by some of the most prominent inquiring minds in literary, cultural, and critical theory today to map out the contours of the field of theory of uncertainty.

Monika Fludernik presents a detailed analysis of free indirect discourse as it relates to narrative theory and the crucial problematic of how speech and thought are represented in fiction, building on the insights of Ann Banfield's *Unspeakable Sentences*. Fludernik radically extends Banfield's model to accommodate evidence from conversational narrative, non-fictional prose, and literary works from Chaucer to the present. Fludernik's model subsumes earlier insights into the forms and functions of quotation and aligns them with discourse strategies observable in the oral language. Drawing on a vast range of literature, she provides an invaluable resource for researchers in the field and introduces English readers to extensive work on the subject in

german as well as comparing the free indirect discourse features of german french and english this study effectively repositions the whole area between literature and linguistics opening up a new set of questions in narrative theory

winner of the aldo and jeanne scaglione prize for comparative literary studies from the modern language association winner of the modern language association s aldo and jeanne scaglione prize for comparative literary studies the border between fact and fiction has been trespassed so often it seems to be a highway works of history that include fictional techniques are usually held in contempt but works of fiction that include history are among the greatest of classics fiction claims to be able to convey its own unique kinds of truth but unless a reader knows in advance whether a narrative is fictional or not judgment can be frustrated and confused in the distinction of fiction dorrit cohn argues that fiction does present specific clues to its fictionality and its own justifications indeed except in cases of deliberate deception fiction achieves its purposes best by exercising generic conventions that inform the reader that it is fiction cohn tests her conclusions against major narrative works including proust s a la recherche du temps perdu mann s death in venice tolstoy s war and peace and freud s case studies she contests widespread poststructuralist views that all narratives are fictional on the contrary she separates fiction and nonfiction as necessarily distinct even when bound together an expansion of cohn s christian gauss lectures at princeton and the product of many years of labor and thought the distinction of fiction builds on narratological and phenomenological theories to show that boundaries between fiction and history can be firmly and systematically explored

the heart of the bibliography is a comprehensive listing of literary and critical studies of biblical texts followed by a discussion of works that evaluate the reception of modern literary criticism in the world of biblical studies
