abstract this thesis argues that uta hagen s a challenge for the actor is more effective than hagen s more widely used respect for acting as a primary text for contemporary actor training chapter 1 tracks ms hagen s evolution as an actress teacher and author chapter 2 summarizes hagen s core artistic values and signature acting techniques chapters 3 through 5 focus on three of these values and techniques chapter 3 examines self observation and transference chapter 4 playing action through animation of body and mind and chapter 5 realism and its relationship to styles of theatre throughout i compare the presentation of these values and techniques in each of her two books and evaluate their relative worth using examples from both texts my experience as a student in her classroom and my own practice teaching her techniques i assert that while both are practicable handbooks for actors acting teachers will get better results from a challenge for the actor

and agents this first reference of its kind devoted exclusively to women also serves as a unique survey of the history of american theatre notable women in the american theatre documents the widespread activities of women in the american theatre as many of them functioned in more than one capacity one of the two appendixes lists names in the various professional categories each entry describes the pertinent facts of biography and contains a descriptive narrative relating to the individual s career with a special notation of her distinguished role in the american theatre a bibliography of the featured woman including sources to be found in books magazines and newspapers is also part of the alphabetical entry to aid readers and researchers 2 separate appendixes contain listings by place of birth and by profession and collate the interrelatedness of the careers of many of the women compiled primarily as a reference for college and university libraries the volume would be a useful supplement to courses in women s studies american studies drama courses taught in english and theatre departments courses in the history of the theatre american history and biography

while hollywood has long been called the dream factory and theatrical entertainment more broadly has been called the industry the significance of these names has rarely been explored there are in fact striking overlaps between industrial rhetoric and practice and the development of theatrical and cinematic techniques for rehearsal and performance interchangeable parts examines the history of acting pedagogy and performance practice in the united states and their debts to industrial organization and philosophy ranging from the late nineteenth century through the end of the twentieth the book recontextualizes the history of theatrical technique in light of the embrace of industrialization in us culture and society victor holtcamp explores the invocations of scientific and industrial rhetoric and philosophy in the founding of the first schools of acting and echoes of that rhetoric in playwriting production and the cinema as hollywood in particular embraced this industrially infected model of acting in their divergent approaches to performance the major us acting teachers lee strasberg stella adler and sanford meisner demonstrated strong rhetorical affinities for the language of industry illustrating the pervasive presence of these industrial roots the book narrates the story of how actors learned to learn to act and what that process for both stage and screen owed to the interchangeable parts and mass production revolutions
